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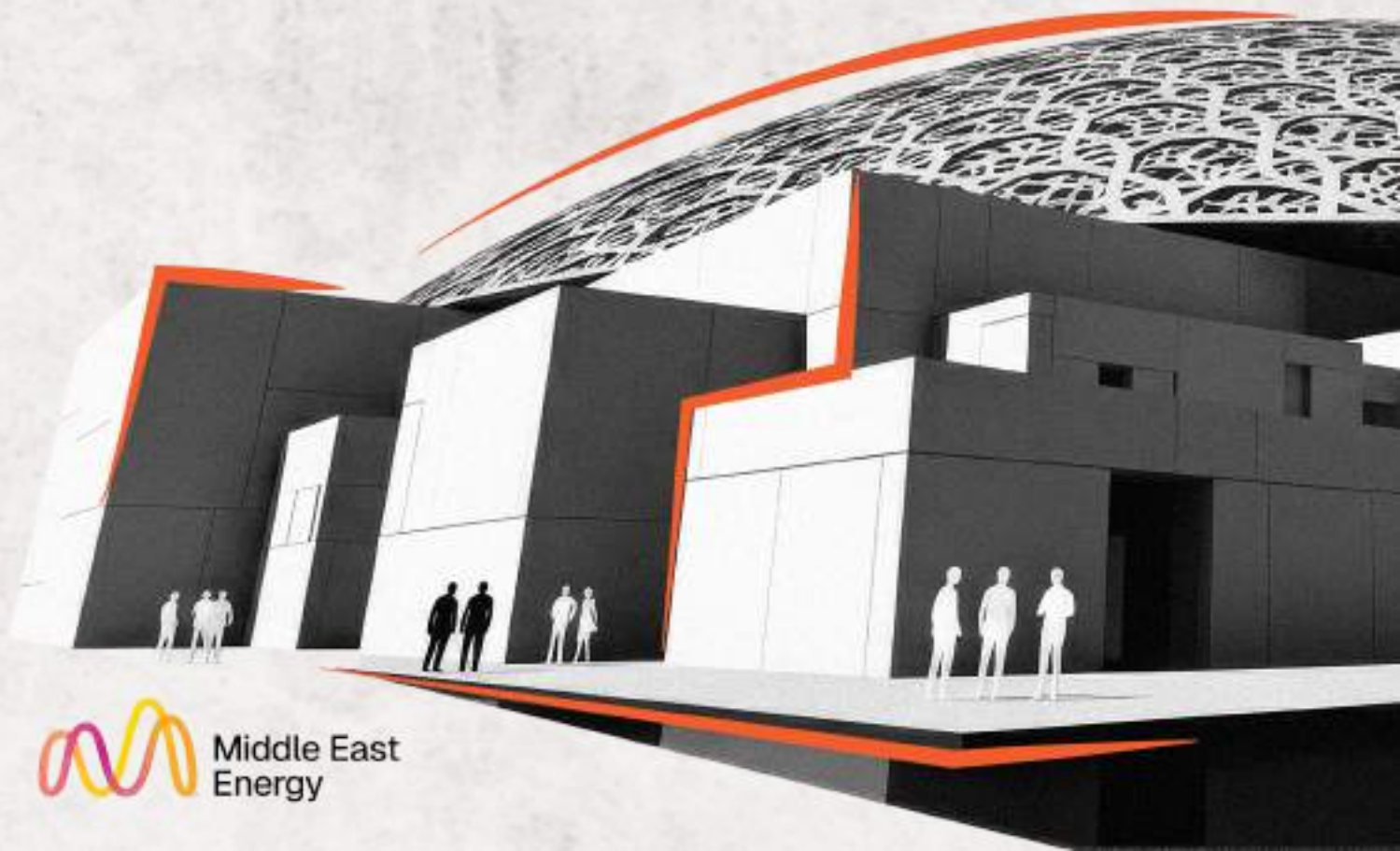

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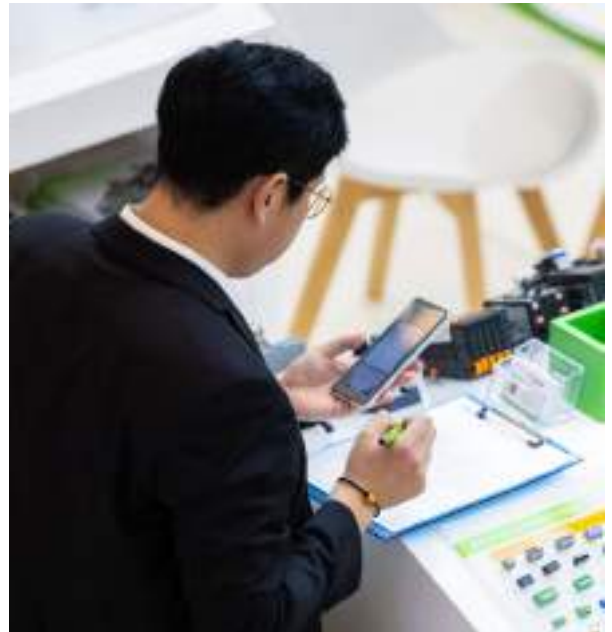
# Fifty years of energy, innovation and impact with **Middle East Energy**

As Middle East Energy marks its milestone edition, we look back at the region's energy journey and the event's role in supporting the Middle East's transition towards a smarter, cleaner and more connected energy future.

In 1976, when the first edition of Middle East Energy (then known as Middle East Electricity) opened its doors in Dubai, it did so in a world that looked very different from today's. Oil dominated conversations.

Renewable energy was a distant idea. The UAE was just five years into its formation. Yet even then, there was an unshakable belief that energy would shape the region's destiny, and that the Middle East would not just participate in that future but help lead it.

Middle East Energy began as a modest gathering of power and electricity professionals. Fifty years later, it has grown into one of the largest and most influential energy events in the Middle East. It is a much-celebrated addition to the region's energy calendar and a living archive of the industry's evolution.



## Mirroring the region's transformation

The story of Middle East Energy is, in many ways, the story of the region itself. As cities like Dubai, Abu Dhabi, Riyadh and Cairo grew upward and outward, so did their energy needs and ambitions. # Powering the energy transition through innovation and local manufacturing

From AI-ready infrastructure and grid modernisation to sustainable manufacturing, DUCAB's CEO for Cable Business Unit, Charles Mellagui shares how innovation and regional expertise are helping shape the future of energy.

## **As demand for reliable, resilient and sustainable power infrastructure continues to grow, what do you see as the biggest priorities for the energy industry over the next decade?**

The energy industry is entering a period of rapid transformation driven by electrification, digitalisation and the transition to cleaner energy sources. Global electricity demand is expected to grow by minimum 4% annually through 2027, while local initiatives like Dubai's Clean Energy 2050 are in place to produce 100% of its energy requirements from clean sources by year 2050. Over the next decade, the priority will be to build energy infrastructure that is reliable, resilient, and capable of meeting growing demand while enabling the large-scale integration of renewable energy. This requires combining a robust energy backbone with intelligent, AI-powered systems that optimize energy use and accommodate emerging demands from artificial intelligence and data centers. Sustainability must also extend across the entire value chain—from responsible sourcing and lower-carbon manufacturing to energy-efficient products and circular economy practices.

**DUCAB has played a significant role in supporting major infrastructure and energy projects across the region. How is the company helping customers meet today's evolving energy needs through its products, manufacturing capabilities and sustainability initiatives?**

Our role has evolved beyond manufacturing cables. Today, we provide integrated energy solutions that help customers build smarter, more efficient and sustainable infrastructure. With one of the region's most comprehensive manufacturing ecosystems, we produce everything from low-voltage and medium-voltage to extra-high-voltage cables. and we support our clients in designing and implementing efficient and optimized cabling particularly for renewable projects, transmission and industrial projects. We continue to invest in innovation, including our high-voltage fibre optic cable technology, digital monitoring solutions and technologies that improve grid performance. Sustainability and 360 recyclability targets remain equally important when designing our products and services. 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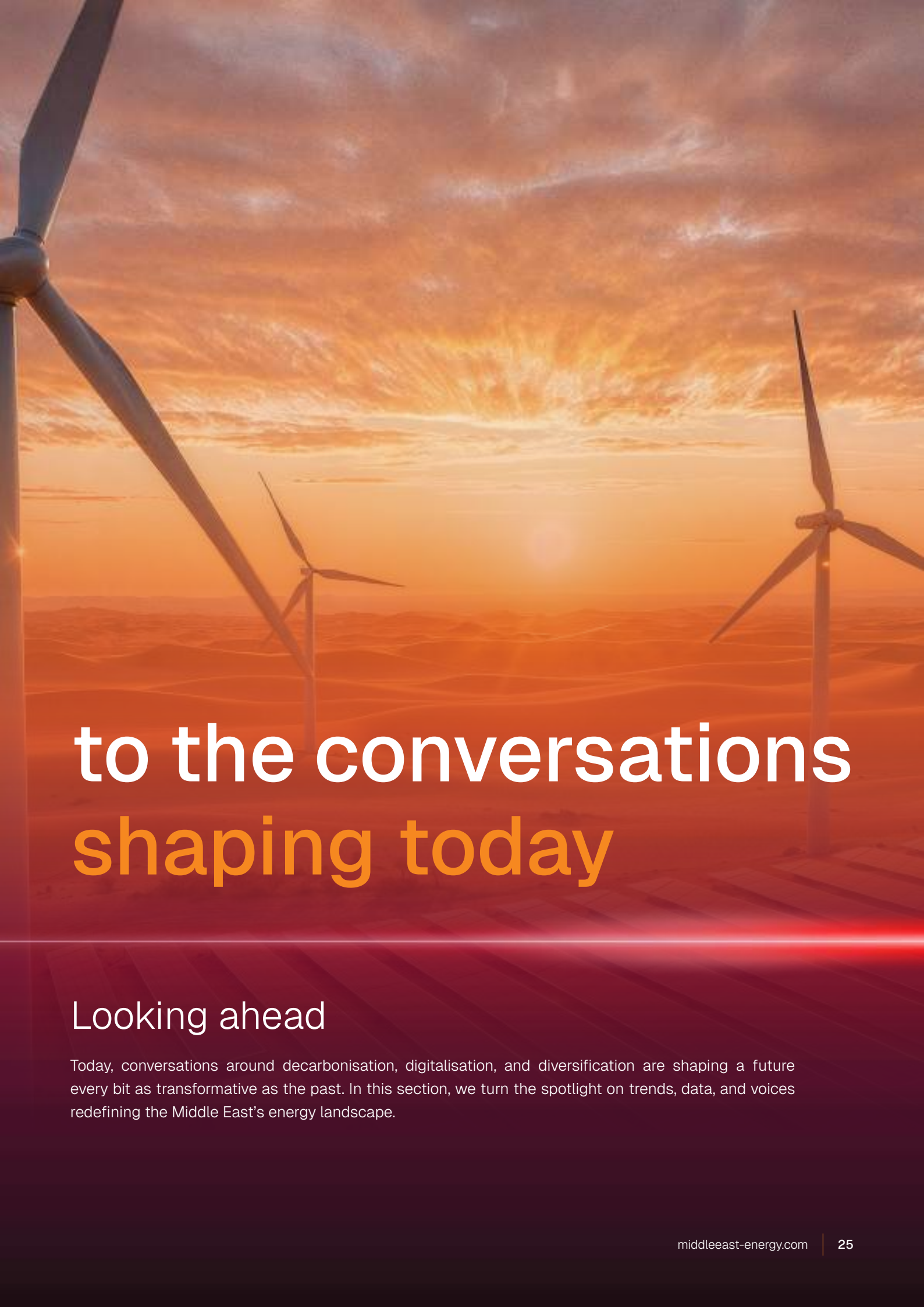

# The evolution of power industry and the growing role of innovation and sustainability

The power industry stands at crossroads. Once dominated by fossil fuels and centralised generation, the industry is undergoing a fundamental reconfiguration driven by climate change, technological breakthroughs, and shifting geopolitical priorities. Energy demand is rising at an unprecedented pace, fuelled by the rapid growth of AI data centres, industrial electrification, and the expanding needs of developing countries.

Emerging technologies such as energy storage, low carbon molecule production and e-mobility are scaling rapidly to meet net-zero targets and urban sustainability goals. According to the International Energy Agency (IEA), clean energy investments are projected to exceed USD 3.3 trillion,

with renewables like solar and wind expected to generate over 40% of global electricity by 2030. China alone will invest USD 627 billion in clean energy this year closely followed by major investments from the USA, European Union, India and other emerging markets.

Yet the industry continues to grapple with balancing power supply and demand while navigating policy changes and supply chain disruptions. Against this backdrop, Middle East Energy (MEE) serves as a global platform, uniting over 45,000 professionals from 178 countries to foster collaboration and drive the energy transition.



## Are trends reshaping the next decade?

As wholesale electricity prices and distribution costs continue to climb globally, power systems face immense pressure prompting utilities to rethink generation and transmission strategies to address growing electricity demands, with renewables leading the charge. Solar and wind installations are accelerating globally, despite challenges such as supply chain bottlenecks and financing hurdles.

New energy policies in 2025 reflect tensions between innovation and regulation, with emerging trends focusing on resilient infrastructure and technological integration. For instance, the US solar sector added 10.8 GW in Q1 2025, a slight dip from 2024 that underscores the need for innovative solutions and supportive policy to overcome these barriers.

Emerging technologies are redefining possibilities. Green hydrogen scaling at 20% annually, and advanced energy storage solutions are critical for grid stability and decarbonisation. Meanwhile, e-mobility is transforming urban sustainability, with EV charging infrastructure expanding to meet growing demand.

Competitive markets and real-time pricing are driving the adoption of clean energy sources, with power sector CO<sub>2</sub> emissions down 45% since 2000. In the Middle East, the UAE and Saudi Arabia are channelling billions into solar and

hydrogen projects, leveraging abundant regional resources to meet ambitious sustainability goals.

However, challenges persist. Workforce shortages, grid reliability, and resilience against extreme weather demand innovative solutions. For example, self-healing grids prioritised by 62% of industry leaders in 2025 are emerging as a key focus for grid modernisation. Geopolitical currents add complexity. Africa's untapped solar potential and Asia's urban grid demands highlight the need for resilient infrastructure, while Middle Eastern nations balance energy exports with domestic diversification. Smart technologies such as AI-driven energy management and advanced metering are critical for integrating renewables and optimising consumption.

Platforms like MEE will continue to play a vital role in uniting global stakeholders to innovate and bridge the clean energy divide, ensuring a sustainable and equitable energy future. This is a decade of bold innovation, where localised energy systems and advanced technologies are redefining the global power landscape.

Decentralised power generation, driven by captive power and microgrids, is blurring traditional buyer-seller boundaries. Independent power producers (IPPs) are leveraging AI-driven demand response models to feed surplus energy back to grids, meeting the 15% annual demand surge through 2030.

Localised supply chains are gaining momentum, with advanced manufacturing of next-generation components addressing critical mineral shortages. Innovations like sodium-ion and flow batteries are projected to capture 25% of the stationary storage market by 2035, ensuring resilience against supply-demand gaps.

Sustainability and efficiency are reshaping energy-intensive sectors. Cogeneration and trigeneration systems are revolutionising industries like desalination, addressing the energy-water nexus while boosting self-sufficiency.

Middle Eastern nations, with 50% of global desalination capacity, are leading this evolution. Similarly, independent, renewably powered microgrids are enabling scalable electrification of transport, with EV charging networks expanding 30% annually, offset by solar and wind to slash carbon footprints. Geopolitically, regions like the Middle East, Africa, and Asia are prioritising localised energy ecosystems.

The UAE and Saudi Arabia are investing \$200 billion in renewables by 2030, while Africa's solar capacity is set to triple. These shifts, supported by MEE's global platform, empower stakeholders to navigate regulatory complexities and supply chain challenges, driving a decentralised, inclusive, and innovative energy future.



## Building a sustainable energy landscape

Middle East Energy has built a legacy of leadership by providing a platform where the energy sector's most pressing issues are addressed through dialogue, innovation, and action. The event's structured focus on five key themes: load growth, grid resilience, grid expansion, energy efficiency, and the electrification of everything ensures that participants gain actionable insights into the trends shaping the industry. The Leadership Summit, a hallmark of MEE, brings together

global and Middle Eastern market leaders to explore policy shifts, investment trends, and strategies for grid resilience and expansion. High-level networking opportunities, such as the VIP Programme and government roundtables, enable forward-thinking dialogue. The inauguration of the Energy Storage Forum at the upcoming edition underscores the event's role as a launchpad for breakthrough technologies. The Energy Storage Forum will explore the integration of



renewables and storage to address intermittency issues with recommendations for supportive policy development and supply chain improvement, mirroring the industry's race against demand gaps. The Intersolar Middle East Forum brings together players from across the world's most influential markets and will reflect the synergies and interaction between photovoltaics, PV production technologies and solar thermal technologies.

As energy leaders grapple with the complex balance of grid expansion, resilience and affordability to meet surging power demands while improving system energy efficiencies, the Technical Excellence Forum will deliver essential strategies for navigating these intersecting challenges and inform global interoperability and technology standardisation recommendations.

The Battery & eMobility Forum will explore EV charging infrastructure development that is essential for managing EV-driven loads while supporting decarbonisation efforts. These forums collectively promote the development of resilient and clean energy infrastructure.

# Fastest growing energy sectors in the Middle East

The Middle East's energy transformation will alter its power generation landscape over the coming decades. Whilst the region has long been synonymous with oil production, the strategic shift towards renewable energy, natural gas infrastructure and nuclear power is now set to reshape its entire energy sector.

## Renewable energy

Solar photovoltaic (PV) is expected to emerge as the predominant source of renewables, supplying more than half of the region's power demand by the middle of 21st century. However, wind will be the fastest growing segment in Middle East's renewable energy market in the near-term.

## Natural Gas

Natural gas represents the largest segment of energy demand growth in the Middle East and North Africa region over the course of the current decade. Expected power demand growth, fueled by population increases, industrial expansion, and rising temperatures, will drive gas-fired generation up 12% by 2030.

## Nuclear Energy

Nuclear energy development is poised for growth in the Middle East, with Saudi Arabia's plans to build 16 nuclear power reactors by 2040.

The UAE already has an operational power plant, among the first in the region, which supplies 25% of its electricity requirements. Egypt and Turkey are each pursuing the development nuclear energy at their own pace.

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# Keeping pace with a **changing** **power sector**

# Turning the region into the next renewable energy powerhouse

In conversation with Francesco La Camera, Director General of the International Renewable Energy Agency (IRENA) on the region's role in accelerating the global energy transition.

## **How do you view the role of the Middle East in accelerating the global transition to renewable energy, particularly in light of its ambitious sustainability goals?**

The Middle East is a key player in the global energy market, and as the energy landscape rapidly transitions toward a renewables-based system, the region must adapt to maintain its leadership. In 2023, the Middle East's total installed renewable power capacity grew by 17.5%, making it the second-fastest growing region in renewable power capacity. Though renewables still form a modest share of the region's total power capacity, this growth signals a pivotal shift. Looking specifically at the GCC countries, the progress is even more pronounced: renewable power capacity surged from 6.1 GW in 2022 to 10.6 GW in 2023, marking an impressive 75% year-over-year increase. This strong momentum reflects growing commitments to clean energy, but progress must accelerate significantly across the broader Middle East to meet climate and development goals.

## **What are the key priorities for the Middle East to accelerate progress?**

To stand any chance of remaining on track to achieve the goals of the Paris Agreement, the world must significantly ramp up renewable capacity additions in the remaining years to reach

more than 11.2 TW of total power capacity by 2030, as outlined in the UAE Consensus at COP28. However, achieving this target requires more than just expanding renewable power capacity. It demands a fundamental transformation of global energy infrastructure, shifting from a centralised, fossil-based system to one that enables the widespread adoption of renewables. To make this transition possible, three key priorities must be urgently addressed. First, the region must transform its existing energy infrastructure, including modernised grid networks to become more balanced, flexible and interconnected.

With abundant low-cost renewables and a strategic geographic location, the Middle East also has a unique opportunity to lead in green hydrogen production. However, realising this potential depends on a well-structured framework for production, trade, and investment. Secondly, policy and regulatory reform must take priority.

Fossil fuel investments still receive greater market support and subsidies, which must urgently be redirected toward renewables. Finally, workforce readiness is key. Investing in education, training, and reskilling programs will not only facilitate a just transition in the Middle East but also unlock new economic opportunities.



**IRENA's recent reports emphasise the importance of international collaboration for achieving net-zero goals. What steps can governments and businesses in the Middle East take to enhance such partnerships?**

Countries in the Middle East have significant potential for energy export and shared energy systems, so it is critical for countries to work together to strengthen cross-border interconnection and joint renewable energy projects, from solar farms to wind energy and green hydrogen infrastructure. IRENA is fostering international collaboration

through initiatives like the Utilities for Net-Zero Alliance (UNEZA). This platform unites leading global utilities and power companies, including key players from the Middle East, such as TAQA.

UNEZA is working to accelerate the development of renewable-ready grid infrastructure, promote clean energy solutions, and advance electrification efforts. Its investment commitments are substantial and continue to grow, with more than USD 117 billion pledged annually for grids and renewable energy projects.

## 01 | PEOPLE

### Laila AL Hadhrami

Founder of Communities Connect Cities & Women Future Cities

I believe the next decade of energy transformation will be driven by empowered, knowledgeable, and responsible individuals. Energy is not merely a technological or industrial sector, but a fundamental pillar for building a better life and achieving a balance between development and the environment, ensuring human well-being and the sustainability of our communities. Through initiative such as Smart Cities and Women of the Future, we empower individuals, particularly women and youth, to be active participants in the transition to clean and sustainable energy.

Our efforts focus on raising awareness, enhancing knowledge, and developing capabilities, contributing to the building of societies capable of embracing major transformations and creating positive change. We recognise that achieving a sustainable energy future cannot be accomplished by a single entity. It requires a long-term, integrated partnership between the public and private sectors, academic institutions, civil society, and innovators to unify visions and achieve the ultimate goal. We believe that the energy transition is not an end, but a path toward a future where development is measured by quality of life, and where people are at the heart of sustainability and the goal of development.



## 02 | TECHNOLOGY

### Eng. Abdulla AlKhemeiri

Chief Operation Officer at Etihad Water & Electricity

Infrastructure will indeed define how effectively nations turn clean-energy ambitions into reality. It is not just an enabler; it's a pacesetter and accelerator of the transition. In the UAE, the focus has shifted from building capacity to building connectivity—making sure that generation, transmission, and consumption move in one rhythm. For us at Etihad Water and Electricity, this is about legacy infrastructure evolving into intelligent, flexible, and smart systems, modernising the grid so renewable energy flows where it's needed, investing in storage to balance variability, and ensuring resilient water and power systems are designed as one integrated network. Over the next decade, as we enter an era of industrial and digital intelligence, demand from data centres and AI will reshape load patterns, while large-scale desalination and EV infrastructure will test resilience. The infrastructure we build today must therefore be flexible, data-aware, and financeable, drawing on strong PPP frameworks and investor confidence. The real transition isn't only about infrastructure, but about the systems powering a future that is secure, sustainable, flexible, and adaptable. That's where the next decade will be won.



## 03 | INFRASTRUCTURE

### Siddharth Malik

Managing Partner at Green Investors AG

The next decade of energy transition will be shaped by key trends in expanding renewable energy, improving energy efficiency, and upgrading grid infrastructure. Specifically, we will witness a continued upsurge of investments in energy storage, green hydrogen, electric vehicles, and emerging decarbonisation technologies. Beyond solar & wind, a new emergence of other technologies such as geothermal and carbon capture/transport/storage is expected to be witnessed. These investments shall significantly be driven by the energy demands of AI, which seeks clean, low-cost, scalable, and reliable power availability. The world is expected to witness a doubling down on current \$53.9 billion investments in energy storage and quadrupling of \$452 million investment in clean shipping driven by targets and mandates, alongside Sustainable Aviation Fuel and new emerging areas such as electrification of industrial heat with an investment of \$77 billion in 2024. Carbon capture, storage, and mineralisation could emerge as a preferred area of capital deployment along with the promise of ~\$1/kg of geological hydrogen to be unlocked. To combat climate change, the world must invest around USD 4 trillion annually in clean energy by 2030. This is a significant gap, but also a historic opportunity with all hands required on deck to meet global net zero ambitions.



## 04 | INVESTMENT

### Dr. Nabih Cherradi

Chief Technology Officer at Desert Technologies

Technology will be the decisive force shaping the next decade of energy, driving a transformation toward a smarter, cleaner, and more resilient global system. Rapid progress in solar and storage technologies from high-efficiency PV cells such as HJT, TOPCon, and emerging perovskite tandem architectures to advanced lithium-ion and solid-state batteries, will continue to reduce costs and improve energy reliability. Simultaneously, digitalisation, artificial intelligence, and smart grid technologies will enable predictive maintenance, real-time energy balancing, and better integration of distributed renewable assets.

Green hydrogen will play a growing role in decarbonising hard-to-abate sectors such as industry and transport, while electrification and sector coupling will link power, mobility, and cooling systems into a more cohesive and flexible energy ecosystem. Together, these innovations will not only make clean energy more affordable and scalable but will also redefine the way energy is produced, stored, and consumed laying the foundation for a sustainable and technology-driven energy decade.



# Can sustainability become a driver of growth in the **Middle Eastern energy sector?**

In conversation with Melina Taprantzi, UN-awarded sustainability strategist, on how ESG, innovation, and workforce transformation are shaping a resilient and low-carbon energy future in the region.

## **What challenges do organisations face in embedding sustainability into their core strategy, and how do you help them overcome these?**

The common tendency is to treat sustainability as a separate function, something that sits on the periphery of operations rather than being embedded in everyday decision-making. This often leads to fragmented efforts, where ESG becomes a checkbox rather than a driver of value. Another challenge is the fear of complexity. Many organisations also hesitate to act because they feel they need to have everything figured out before taking the first step. But sustainability is a marathon, not a sprint. It is a journey that requires a mindset shift. I focus on helping leadership teams reframe sustainability not as a constraint, but as a lens for opportunity.

Whether we're mapping material ESG risks or designing future-fit strategies, my approach is to connect sustainability goals with business outcomes such as innovation, growth, or talent attraction. Once companies see that ESG is not about compliance, but a competitive advantage, they begin to move with more confidence and clarity.

## **How is the energy sector evolving to help achieve the Sustainable Development Goals, especially in emerging markets like the Middle East?**

The energy sector is the engine room of the SDGs. Without access to reliable, affordable, and clean energy, progress on education, health, water access, and economic growth stalls. In markets like the Middle East, the opportunity is even more profound.

The region is not just a consumer of innovation; it is also becoming a producer. We're seeing bold moves through investments in green hydrogen, solar megaprojects, and regional interconnectivity plans that can replace older, carbon-intensive systems.

To achieve the SDGs, the energy sector must be agile and inclusive. That means investing in workforce transition, supporting community resilience, and ensuring that innovation serves both people and the planet.

This is exactly the kind of transformation we support through the Sustainability and ESG Programme at Kaplan, where we help regional leaders develop the tools to drive these changes with insight and impact.

Especially in the GCC, where an oil-dominated legacy is giving way to some of the world's most ambitious and brave moves towards a diversified, low-carbon energy future, education and upskilling are crucial to turning ambition into action.

## How does strong ESG performance support organisational resilience, particularly in rapidly transforming sectors like energy and utilities?

“ESG is the new language of trust. And trust is the currency of resilience.” In sectors like energy and utilities, which are at the frontline of climate risk and technological disruption, resilience isn’t just about hard assets; it is about adaptive cultures and trusted relationships.

Companies that perform well on ESG metrics tend to have better stakeholder alignment, more engaged employees, and a stronger social licence to operate. These are the exact traits that help organisations weather crises and lead during transitions. I’ve seen firsthand how engaging stakeholders can transform resistance into co-creation. Whether it’s regulators, communities, or investors, the organisations that succeed are the ones that listen, respond, and evolve.

## How does the Middle East approach sustainability differently, and where do you see the greatest potential for impact?

What excites me most about the Middle East is the speed and ambition of its transformation. There is a clear top-down mandate in many countries to integrate sustainability into national visions and economic diversification strategies.

But what’s even more powerful is the emergence of grassroots energy: young professionals, entrepreneurs, and local innovators who are pushing boundaries. Compared to more mature markets, where sustainability might be slowed by legacy systems and regulations, the Middle East has the advantage of being able to build new systems from the ground up. That means embedding circularity, digitalisation, and ESG thinking from the start. Through my work with global institutions, I’ve seen firsthand how professionals in this

region are actively seeking education that is both globally grounded and regionally relevant. There’s a real shift from theory to practice: people want to gain the tools, frameworks, and mindset needed to lead sustainability efforts in their industries and communities. The greatest potential lies in linking sustainability with identity and not just seeing it as an obligation, but as a source of pride, relevance, and purpose. In sectors like energy and utilities, this can take the form of bold infrastructure plays, regional collaboration, and climate-smart innovation that sets a new global benchmark.

## What does impactful leadership look like today, particularly in sustainability-driven sectors like energy?

Impactful leadership today means being both visionary and vulnerable. It is about having the courage to challenge old paradigms while being honest about the uncertainties we face. It is about sharing setbacks and challenges openly, as nothing really happens overnight. In sectors like energy, leaders are stewards of transition and innovation. That requires systems thinking, intergenerational responsibility, and the ability to bring diverse voices to the table.

It also means embracing experimentation: trying new models, learning fast, and adapting with humility. Investing in workforce development and upskilling ensures that the people driving these transitions have the tools, mindsets, and support to lead change from within.

To me, impactful leaders are those who can translate global goals into local actions. Those who can align sustainability with strategy and inspire others not just by what they say, but by what they do. Most importantly, they create space for others to lead too, because sustainability transformation cannot be a solo act, it must be a collective performance.

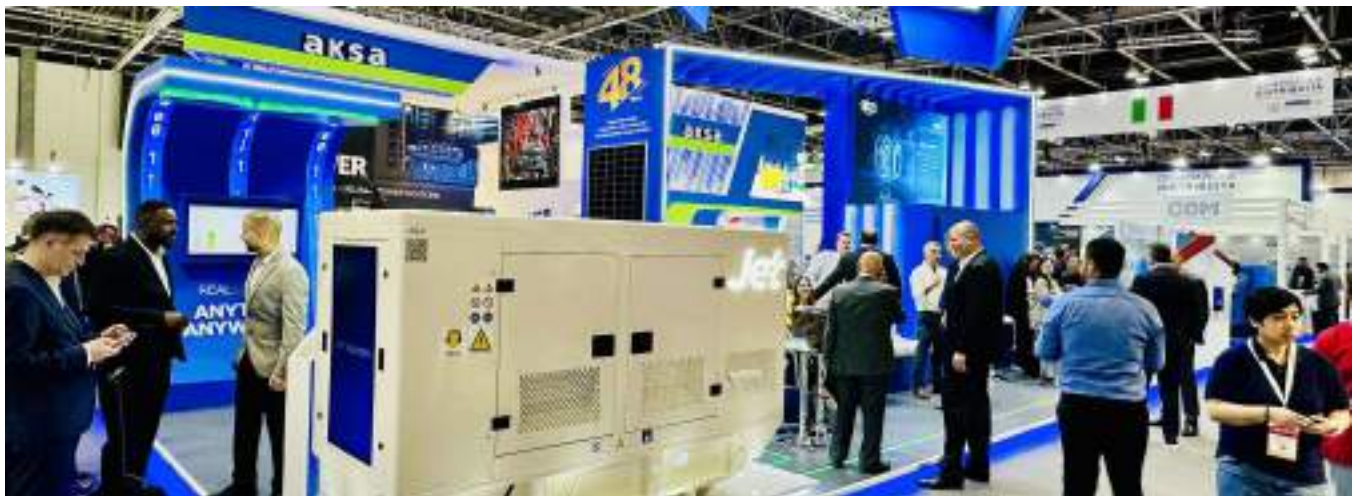

## Leading by example

Each year, Middle East Energy continues to raise the bar for sustainability in both event delivery and the wider energy ecosystem. In 2025, the show delivered more than 13 hours of content aligned with United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 7, supporting the transition towards affordable and clean energy. The event has also made measurable progress in advancing gender equality. Since 2023, women speaker representation across the conference agenda has increased by 61.9%, supporting SDG 5 and contributing to a more inclusive industry dialogue.

Middle East Energy's influence extends strongly into the renewables and wind energy sectors. In 2025, renewable exhibitor participation grew by 53% compared to 2023, reflecting the rapid expansion and growing confidence of the sector. Developing future talent remains another key focus. In 2025, the event welcomed 146 students through dedicated engagement initiatives, offering hands-on exposure to real-world technologies, live case studies and direct interaction with industry experts. For many, it transformed classroom theory into practical understanding and career clarity.

## Better Stands Programme



More than 75% of stands at Middle East Energy now use modular or reusable stand systems. ## From event to **industry ecosystem**

From year-round engagement to personalised experiences and high-value connections, Clare Puddifoot, Chief Marketing Officer, shares how Middle East Energy is evolving from a global trade show into an energy ecosystem designed to connect the people, ideas and investment shaping the region's future.

### **Middle East Energy is much more than three days on the show floor. What happens behind the scenes to keep the industry engaged throughout the year?**

The exhibition is the culmination of months of work. Everything starts by listening to our exhibitors, visitors and industry partners to understand the challenges and conversations shaping the sector. Those insights guide the themes we focus on throughout the year, from AI and energy security to grid modernisation and battery storage.

A big part of that is extending those conversations beyond the event itself. Our content and PR strategy brings industry perspectives into national and regional media through executive interviews, thought leadership and media roundtables, keeping the issues shaping the sector visible and relevant year-round.

By the time the event opens, most attendees have already engaged with our content, planned meetings and identified the technologies they want to explore.

### **How do you attract the industry to Middle East Energy?**

Our approach is really a combination of scale and precision. Middle East Energy is a global event rooted in Dubai, so we want the brand to feel highly visible in our home market, while at the same time being incredibly targeted in how we reach the individual communities that make up the energy ecosystem. If you're in Dubai in the lead-up to the event,

you may have seen our advertising while booking an Uber or riding in a Hala taxi, heard us on the radio, or been welcomed to Dubai as you arrive at the airport.

Internationally, we become even more targeted. We map priority markets and energy hubs and build campaigns around the specific audiences we need to bring into the room. That might mean specialist activity in India or the CIS, dedicated campaigns across markets such as Saudi Arabia and Turkey, or working with industry associations and local partners who give us access to highly relevant communities. We also support international audiences with practical considerations such as visas, because attracting someone is only valuable if we can help them make the journey.

As we get closer to the event, the focus shifts again from awareness to intent. Through email, WhatsApp, personalised VIP communications and our digital platforms, we're helping people plan their visit, discover exhibitors, build their agenda, arrange meetings and invite their wider networks.

So while people might experience Middle East Energy through a billboard, a taxi, an email or a LinkedIn message, behind that is a highly connected marketing ecosystem. Every campaign has to demonstrate a reason to attend. The objective isn't simply to reach the largest possible audience. It's to identify the people who can influence, invest in and deliver the region's energy projects, give them a compelling reason to attend, and ultimately bring the right people together in Dubai.



### **How do you make an event of this scale feel relevant and personal to each individual attending?**

That's one of the biggest opportunities we have. People are investing their time in coming to Middle East Energy, so the experience needs to feel worth that investment from the moment they start planning their visit.

That means helping people quickly find what is most relevant to them, whether that's the technologies they want to discover, the conference sessions that address their priorities, or the people they need to meet. The goal is to move away from a one-size-fits-all event experience and give each visitor a clearer sense of what is there for them.

For some audiences, that means more curated experiences, including Hosted Buyer support and introductions through our investor team. We're also using AI and new digital tools to make that discovery easier, from an AI-powered web chat and personalised agenda to short-form video content that gives audiences a quick sense of what they can expect.

Ultimately, we want people to arrive with a sense of purpose; knowing where to go, who to meet and what they want to take away from the experience.

### **In a world where business can happen anywhere, why does bringing the energy ecosystem together still matter; and how do you turn those face-to-face moments into real business outcomes?**

Digital channels have transformed how we connect, and we see those connections creating true value when they lead to bringing the right people together in person. Our role isn't simply to attract an audience; it's to create an ecosystem where the right conversations can happen between the right people. One example is our Hosted Buyer and Energy Club programmes, designed to create a multi-layered meeting programme. It takes more than two roles to get a large-scale energy project into production, so we see this as an opportunity to connect all the roles needed to turn possibility into power. This covers everyone, from government and regulators to financiers, OEMs and manufacturers, all the way through to integrators and contractors. This year, these programmes will welcome more than 1,200 curated international buyers, representing around US\$98 billion in planned investment and purchasing, alongside 56 international buyer delegations.

### **In 2027, Middle East Energy moves to Dubai Exhibition Centre. What does this mean for the future of the event?**

2027 represents an important new chapter for Middle East Energy. The move to Dubai Exhibition Centre (DEC) isn't just about a larger venue, it's a complete reimagining of how we deliver value at scale. DEC gives us the space to grow, but more importantly, it challenges us to make that growth meaningful. We're creating a more navigable, more intentional experience that maintains the density and commercial energy that makes Middle East Energy valuable. What excites me most is the opportunity to design distinct zones that align with how people actually want to engage. Someone exploring emerging technologies needs a different environment from someone negotiating a multi-million-dollar project. At DEC, we can create dedicated spaces; from innovation showcases to premium Decision Rooms that serve these different objectives with the focus they deserve.

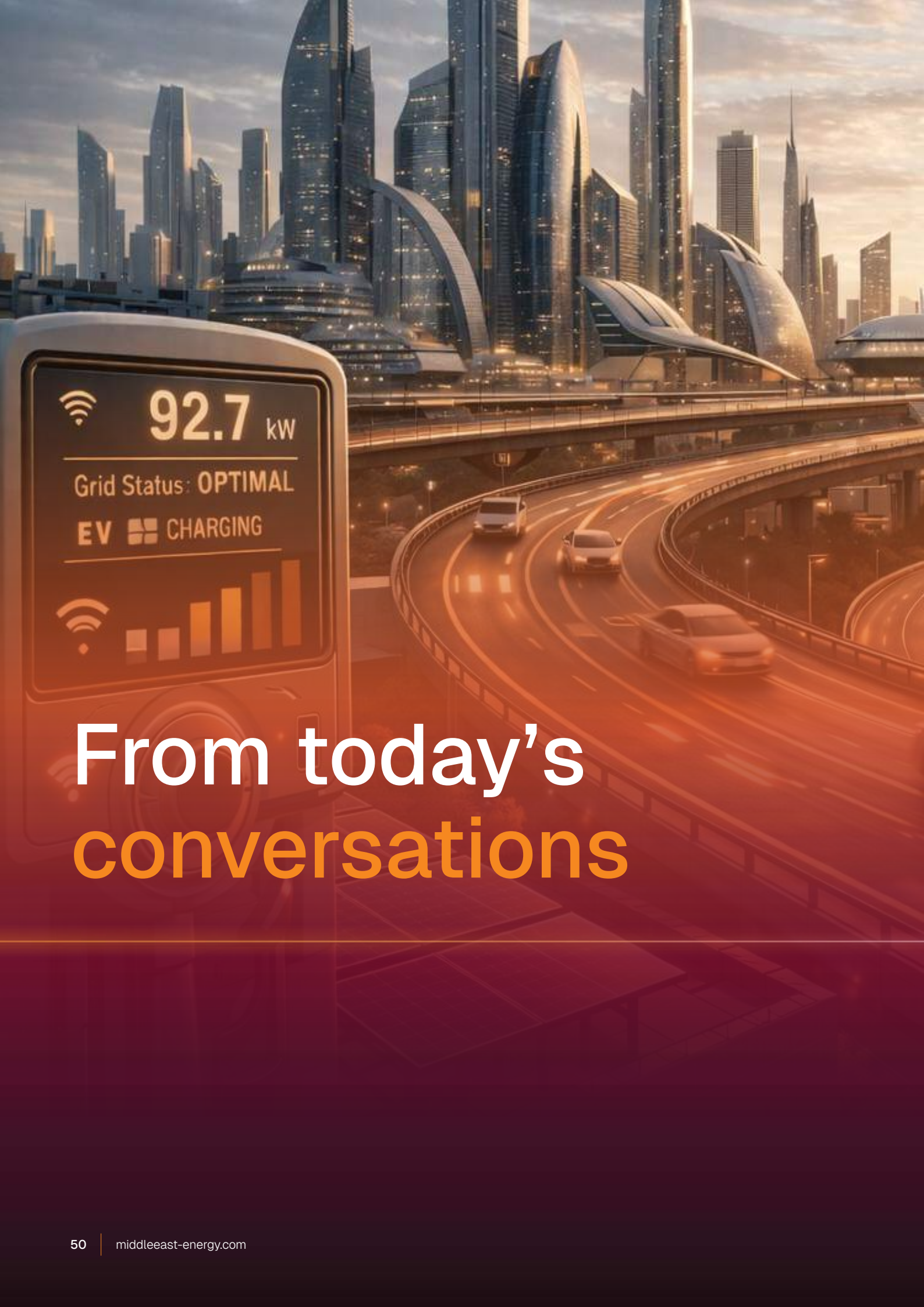

# Redefining leadership in the new era of energy

Lubna Alwahaibi, Managing Director of Siemens Energy Oman, shares her insights on guiding teams, fostering local talent, and driving sustainable growth in a rapidly evolving energy sector.

## What's been your journey to becoming the Managing Director at Siemens Energy Oman?

My journey to becoming Managing Director at Siemens Energy Oman has been shaped by over two decades in the energy sector – a period of significant change and transformation. When I began my career in 2001, women in leadership were still rare, and building a path forward required determination and resilience. Throughout my career, I have had the privilege of holding commercial, operational, and leadership roles at both local and international energy companies, including Schlumberger, Abraj Energy Services, and Air Products. Each experience broadened my perspective on how energy can drive Oman's economic growth and societal progress, and deepened my belief in the power of knowledge and collaboration. Pursuing my MBA at the University of Hull was another important milestone that equipped me with the tools

to navigate complex business and leadership challenges. Yet beyond formal education, it has been my commitment to lifelong learning, trust in people, and adaptability that truly guided my journey. These values strongly resonate with Siemens Energy's culture that empowers local talent, nurtures future leaders, and opens doors for women to thrive. Today, as the first Omani to lead Siemens Energy Oman, I see my role as more than managing operations. It's about inspiring teams, connecting global expertise with national priorities, and ensuring that our strategic goals contribute to Oman's sustainable growth. For me, success lies in achieving the right balance between localisation, innovation, and sustainability. These three pillars will define the country's energy future.

## What has been a pivotal project or decision in your career that changed how you approach leadership in the sector?

One of the most pivotal moments in my career came when I realized that leadership in the energy sector surpasses operational excellence and project delivery. I choose to lead beyond balance sheets, driving transformation through opportunity, empowerment, and legacy-building in a profoundly changing sector. True leadership lies in the ability to navigate transformation and create long-term impact. Early in my journey, I tackled challenges with a strong focus on execution, delivering results, meeting targets, and ensuring reliability. While these remain essential, I made a defining decision to broaden my approach and lead with a focus on

people and purpose. This shift taught me that sustainable success comes from enabling others to grow and build trust across the entire ecosystem. I now empower teams and foster diverse perspectives. This approach ensures every business achievement contributes to national development and societal progress. That turning point redefined how I lead today as Managing Director of Siemens Energy Oman. I connect global expertise with local ambitions to create an environment where talent thrives and resilience grows for the future.

## How do you envision the Middle Eastern energy sector evolving in the next decade?

Over the next decade, the Middle Eastern energy landscape will be defined by rapid growth in electricity demand driven by expanding populations, diversified economies, and accelerating electrification across sectors such as transport, industry, and digital infrastructure. The region's challenge will be to meet this rising demand sustainably while maintaining reliability and resilience. We will see a shift toward more integrated and flexible energy systems. Hybrid solutions that combine renewables with flexible gas, storage, and emerging technologies like hydrogen and nuclear will become the norm to balance volatility and ensure stable supply. Smarter, more resilient networks equipped with advanced transmission

systems and AI-based controls will be essential to manage fluctuating generation and rising consumption. Another defining trend is localization. Governments are linking energy transformation with industrial development, encouraging local manufacturing, service hubs, and skills transfer to build self-sufficiency and long-term resilience. In this evolving context, success won't come from focusing on individual technologies alone. The real opportunity lies in shaping interconnected, adaptive energy ecosystems that bring generation, transmission, and industry together into one cohesive system

## What skills and qualities do you believe will be essential for the next generation of energy professionals to succeed in a rapidly changing sector?

I have learned that success in the energy sector requires more than academic qualifications or technical expertise. The next generation of energy professionals must be digitally agile, resilient, and keenly aware of regional and international changes. In a global and fast-evolving industry like energy, challenges are inevitable. Staying focused, adapting to change, and remaining committed to long-term goals are essential. I actively encourage my teams to view obstacles as opportunities for growth and innovation. Equally important are empathy and inclusivity. In the next 15 years, more than 127 million young people across the MENA region will enter the job market, bringing with them diverse backgrounds, ideas, and perspectives. Leading diverse teams has taught

me the value of understanding different perspectives. When leaders create inclusive environments where everyone feels heard and respected, they unlock creativity, collaboration, and performance. Continuous learning and adaptability are also vital. The energy sector is evolving quickly, and staying ahead means staying curious. I urge young professionals to invest in their development and remain open to learning at every stage of their careers. To young Omani professionals, I say: believe in your potential and take ownership of your journey. Step outside your comfort zone, gain hands-on experience, and pursue excellence.

## In your role, how do you aim to mentor or inspire the next generation of energy leaders, particularly women?

It is my duty to mentor and help shape the pathways of the next generation of leaders, especially women who still need further representation in the energy sector. My approach begins with visibility and authenticity. I want young professionals including women to see that competence and vision – not gender – define leadership. Representation matters, and I aim to normalise women's presence at the decision-making table. Equally important is creating real opportunities. At Siemens

Energy, we invest heavily in developing local talents through structured training, mentorship, and stretch assignments that allow young professionals to build confidence and leadership skills early in their careers. For women, I encourage open dialogue about the challenges they may face and provide coaching that empowers them to turn those challenges into strengths.

# Driving the UAE towards a low carbon future with **EVs and hybrids**

Jacques Brent, Managing Director of Al-Futtaim Toyota and Lexus UAE, on how hybrids, EVs, and multi-technology solutions are shaping a cleaner, more accessible mobility landscape in the Emirates.

## **As the UAE accelerates its clean energy transition, how is Toyota aligning its mobility strategy to support the country's vision?**

At Toyota, we believe in supporting every market's unique journey toward sustainability and the UAE is setting a global benchmark with its ambitious energy transition goals. Toyota's global sustainability roadmap, particularly the Toyota Environmental Challenge 2050, is actively implemented in the UAE, aligning with our commitment to achieving carbon neutrality and reflecting the local commitment to sustainability and climate action, as evidenced by the "Sustainable and Practical" mobility solutions being offered. Toyota's Environmental Challenge 2050 is a global initiative,

encompassing efforts in the UAE through the adoption of sustainable mobility solutions and collaborative research for hydrogen energy. This challenge aligns with the United Nations SDGs and involves reducing CO<sub>2</sub> emissions from new vehicles by 90% (compared to 2010 levels), promoting the use of hybrid, plug-in hybrid, electric, and fuel cell vehicles, and focusing on resource conservation and biodiversity.

## **How is Al-Futtaim Toyota preparing to meet the growing demand for electrified mobility in the Emirates?**

Al-Futtaim Toyota is taking a comprehensive approach to readiness; expanding our portfolio of electrified vehicles, partnering with public and private stakeholders to accelerate infrastructure development, and investing in retail and aftersales capabilities to support EV adoption at scale. We're also actively collaborating with government bodies, fleet operators, and sustainability-focused businesses to electrify commercial transport and develop green mobility solutions tailored for the UAE. Our hybrid sales have grown substantially year-on-year, and we will shortly be scaling up our BEV offerings to match rising consumer demand.



## **From electric vehicles and hybrids to innovations like hydrogen or ammonia-powered engines, Toyota continues to explore multiple pathways toward sustainable mobility. What is the strategic thinking behind this multi-tech approach, and how does it serve the UAE market's unique needs?**

As the global shift towards sustainable mobility accelerates, Toyota Motor Corporation has strategically positioned its brands to serve distinct market segments with tailored electrification approaches. Toyota continues to lead the mass market in electrified vehicle offerings. Its portfolio of hybrids, plug-in hybrids, and fuel-efficient internal combustion engines makes sustainable mobility accessible to a broader consumer base, especially in regions where EV infrastructure

is still developing. Meanwhile, Lexus, the company's luxury arm, has carved out a leadership position in the premium hybrid segment. By integrating electrified powertrains into its hallmark of comfort, craftsmanship, and performance, Lexus has made hybrid technology aspirational. Models like the new LX 700h are luxury symbols that reflect a growing consumer preference for sustainable performance. In many markets, Lexus hybrids have outsold their petrol-only counterparts,

reflecting a shift in how high-end consumers define value and innovation. Together, Toyota and Lexus exemplify a multi-pathway strategy: meeting consumers where they are while steadily moving them towards a carbon-neutral future. Where Toyota builds scale and trust in electrification for everyday drivers, Lexus redefines what sustainable luxury looks like on the road. This multi-pathway strategy is rooted in pragmatism and inclusivity. We recognise that a one-size-fits-all approach doesn't work, especially in a region as diverse and climate-sensitive as the Middle East. Factors like grid capacity, energy

mix, infrastructure readiness, and user preferences vary across markets, and our strategy reflects that reality. For the UAE, hybrids provide an immediate, impactful solution with no dependency on charging infrastructure. Having invested in all the meaningful powertrain alternatives, our aim is to support every step of the UAE's clean mobility roadmap with proven, scalable, and accessible technologies that are implemented in due course.

### **What shifts are you seeing in customer behaviour regarding sustainability? How are these trends influencing your product development and local energy collaborations?**

We're seeing a definitive shift in customer expectations, especially among younger, urban consumers who want their mobility choices to reflect their values. Sustainability, ethical manufacturing, and environmental impact are now part of the buying criteria, not just performance or price. This shift is influencing everything: from the vehicles we introduce, to how we communicate, to how we partner with energy providers and government entities. For instance, our recent consumer research showed that nearly two-thirds of UAE residents

want EVs to be their primary mode of transport. That insight shapes how we design our product mix, expand our hybrid and EV offerings, and build local energy collaborations to support a seamless ownership experience. Ultimately, this is a long-term mindset shift. As Toyota's exclusive distributor in the UAE, we are committed to shaping a mobility ecosystem where every customer can contribute meaningfully to a more sustainable UAE.



### **Do you see hybrid technology as a transitional phase or a long-term pillar of mobility in the country?**

We see hybrid technology as a vital, long-term pillar in the UAE's mobility landscape. The beauty of hybrid vehicles lies in their ability to deliver immediate CO<sub>2</sub> reduction without requiring new infrastructure or behavioural change. The success of the Lexus LX 700h and our broader hybrid lineup underscores that consumer trust in this technology is growing. As BEV infrastructure scales and customer habits evolve, we'll continue to expand our electric offerings. But hybrids will remain a critical tool in the decarbonisation journey especially as part of fleet electrification and the national sustainability agenda.
